Complaints continue re attacks on native towns in Nunez by Portuguese - in search of slaves. Until recently a petty war was being carried on between Bateman & Pearce (2 native chiefs & descendants of past slave traders). Both have sold their captives in Bissao & Cacheo.

In early March H.M.S. visited the Nunez, & the war ended with "decisive success" by Bateman. Says that in April trade had returned to 1/2 normal & even was some trade to Isles de Los.

Nunez trade - wax, hides, ivory, etc - related next to Gambia in importance. The slave trade was having least trade for the return to Bissao or Cacheo. Suggests that better markets & goods will draw them to G.B. factories.
